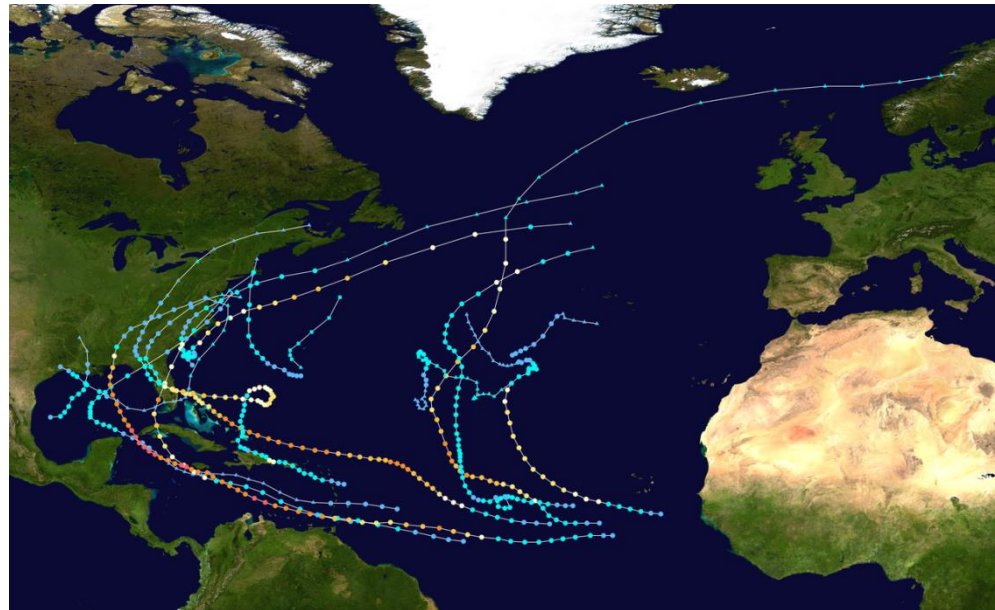

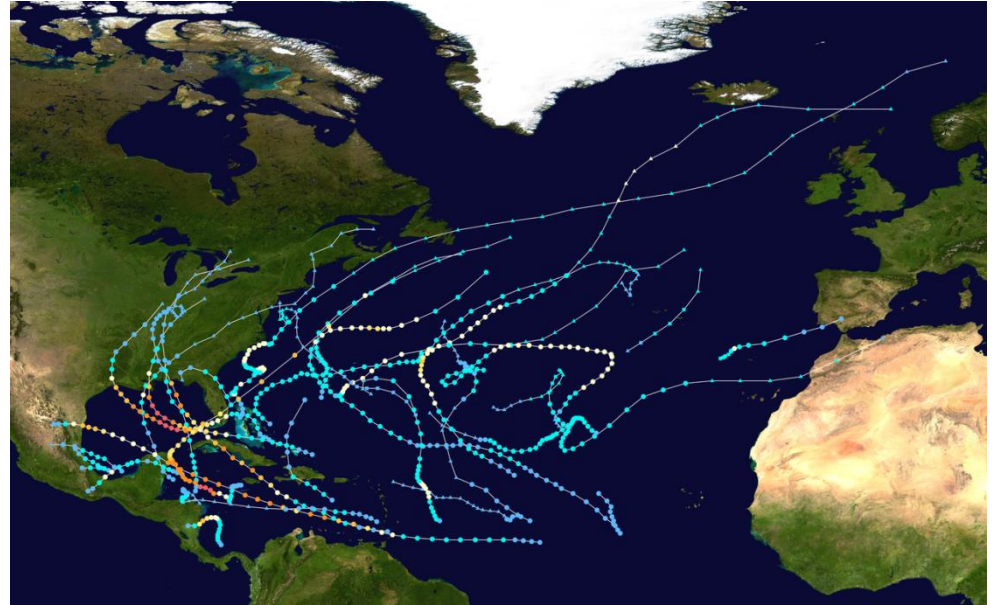
# FDEM RESPONSE HISTORY

# PROJECT TIMELINE

- 96 hours prior to landfall
  - Notification
  - Evacuations
- Landfall
  - Incident Action Planning
- 72 hours after landfall
  - Search
  - Stabilize
  - Rescue
- Recovery

# USE A SLEDGE HAMMER
